The suppression of information. The list of things to fear goes on and on. And Maldoro uses all of it.

It's biggest overreach has been in it's initiatives with Boethema Labs. Boethema is among our oldest institutions, having operated for a nearly a millennium. It's successes have helped ensure our longevity as a species by preserving genetic diversity. They've essentially eradicated disease, helping us prolong our lives in many cases.

Children designed by Boethema are considered to be genetically sound, while traditionally-bred children face a slew of congenital disorders. And their mothers are unlikely to survive their births. For that reason, Boaethema babies are called "desirables." But that begs the question: what is desirable?

Buehl Starbringer's father was a complacent idiot, and let it happen while pandering to the war hawks. It was a bloodbath. But there were people who resisted in secret. Children—if possible, entire families—were smuggled out of the city. With very few ways in and out, it was a dangerous task. Despite the efforts of these vigilante smugglers, many children still died, or their families died trying to save them. That is the Starbringer family legacy.

Where does the Etruvian fit in this picture? In the vaults of Boethema is a hidden cornucopia of Jhardeho research, where scientists work to unlock the secrets of our evolution. Designing a human baby is easy. But designing an Etruvian, a supreme being, is no easy feat. It was something Maldoro was desperate to achieve.
